

Planning an Animals in Emergencies Display

Here's some ideas and tips to set up a display to help people plan for their animals in emergencies. Many resources are available on the *Get Ready Animals* website:

You might like to do this as part of your breed club, sporting association, emergency service organisation, or charity at your local show, school fete, business, or other event.

Plenty to see - Props and Freebies!

Having some animal related props set up helps draw attention to your display and shows people what they need to do to plan for their animals.

Set up an **Animal Emergency Grab and Go Bag** with the contents on a showbag-like display and don't forget to print out the <u>Emergency Grab and Go Bag for Pets Poster</u> to go with it.

Another great visual display can be made up using a pet crate or carrier set up with a fluffy toy animal inside, plus all the other Grab and Go Bag contents.

You will need the following:

- Crate, carrier or cage
- Fluffy toy animal
- Pet food
- Bowls
- Toys
- Bag of treats
- Leads, collars, harnesses
- Bedding requirements
- Poo bags, litter tray etc
- Vaccination record

Freebies, like a bowl of dog biscuits, magnets, dog tags, or other merchandise always helps to draw people in. You can then have a **Pet Chat**.....













Have a Pet Chat

People love talking about their pets, so while they are looking at your awesome display and checking out the freebies, use the opportunity to ask them a bit about their pets. Questions like....

What type and how many animals do they have? What breeds are they?

You can then say something like.....

We're here today to help people plan for their pets in emergencies. If you had minutes to evacuate, have you thought about:

- How you would find and contain your animals if they are panicked and hiding?
- How would you transport your animals?
- Where would you go that's safe for you and your animals?
- What if you weren't at home when the emergency occurred, who would help your animals?
- What would you take with you for your animal if you couldn't return home for a week?
